The priority seats in Metro's trains and buses are meant for people with disabilities and for senior citizens. If you're sitting in one and someone needs it more than you, obey the signs and give it to them. It's the right thing to do. And it's the law.

Metro Rider Tips

- Priority seats are located near the center doors of every rail car.
- Keep priority seats available for people with disabilities and for senior citizens.
- Be courteous to your fellow riders.
- If someone needs a seat more than you, give it to them.
- If you need a seat, don't be afraid to ask for one.
- Pay attention to your surroundings.
- Don't get distracted by electronic devices or reading material.
- Always be aware of what is going on around you.
- If there is an emergency, use the intercom at either end of each rail car to contact the train operator. Or call Metro Transit Police at 202-962-2121.
