# Overall Ridership in November

## Rail

- Weekday ridership has increased almost 60% compared to November 2021.


## Bus

- Ridership has increased 30% on Saturdays compared to November 2021, and close to 20% on weekdays and Sundays.

## Parking

- Usage has increased 92% compared to November 2021.


Ridership was stable in the first half of the month and decreased around Thanksgiving. Rail and bus ridership grew year over year in November 2022.

# Silver Line Phase II Opening


## Ridership

- The six new stations saw on average of 2,200 riders on weekdays and 2,500 riders on Saturdays.
  - High average Saturday ridership was driven primarily by riders at Ashburn.
- As anticipated, ridership at Wiehle-Reston decreased 46% from October average weekday ridership levels as customers started to use the new stations.
  - Ridership at new stations is 1.7x higher than lost ridership at Wiehle-Reston, indicating potential new riders.
- 13% of SVII trips are starting and ending within the new segment.

## Parking

- The most popular station for parking among Silver Line Phase II stations was Loudoun Gateway at 32% utilization (utilization = average daily transactions / parking capacity)



# Metrobus Ridership

- Ridership is up about 20% on weekdays, and Sundays and 30% on Saturdays compared to November 2021.
- About 2.1% of stop events were above crowding thresholds with more crowding on weekdays.
- Notes:
  - Bus service levels remained at about 93% of pre-Covid levels on weekdays, 110-125% on weekends.




# Pre-Pandemic Ridership Comparison

**Current vs. pre-pandemic levels (November 2022 vs. November 2019):**

- **Rail** ridership was at 42% of pre-pandemic levels on weekdays and 61-66% of pre-pandemic levels on weekends
- **Bus** ridership was at 77% of pre-pandemic levels on weekdays, and 97% of pre-pandemic levels on weekends
- **Parking** usage was at 30% of pre-pandemic levels
